I would like to recommend the following New Year's resolution; how about trying to grow deeper in your faith and improving your relationship God? The following are five hallmarks or ways which will help you achieve this resolution if you choose to try.

1. **Worship regularly in community.** That means attending a church worship service regularly. Spending Sunday mornings in worship here at the First Congregational Church of Rockport is one way to do this. Or if you are on vacation or traveling try attending a worship service where you are.
2. Get in the habit of **reading scripture regularly.** This may mean once a week or daily. Reading scripture in the morning may help you see things differently throughout the day. Reading scripture in the evening can help put your day into a positive perspective.

3. *Pray regularly.* Remember prayer is a conversation with God. Developing a daily prayer practice is a wonderful way to stay connected to God. (If you do not know how to do this call me, I can teach you a few different ways to pray.)

4. *Give of your time, skills and finances* to the work of the church. Everything we do here has a ripple effect throughout God's created world. If you have never pledged to the church or volunteered your time to a committee or project ask someone who has. I am sure they would be more than willing to explain why they do it and the benefits they receive from either one. (If you have given of your time, skills, and money in the past but wish to do more you can. We have many new projects starting which need lots of help and feel free to increase your pledge if you feel called too.)

5. Do some form of *outreach work* within the community. This could be as simple as helping out at your children's school, working on a church mission project or volunteering your time with a local service organization. There are many opportunities and programs to get involved with. If you have never done this kind of thing give me a call and I will help you find something you may be interested in.

These five hallmarks, as I refer to them, are all aspects of discipleship. It is what we are called to by our baptismal vows. It is also a great way to grow deeper in your faith, closer to Jesus and thus closer to God. I assure you this is one New Year's resolution that has far reaching benefits and is really very easy to achieve.

**Meeting Minutes: December, 2019**

**Trustee Meeting** – called to order at 7:01 PM. Derek opened the meeting with a prayer.

**Present:** Bruce Coates, Treasurer; Mark Jurewicz; Bonnie Gray; Walter Vining; Chip Kistner; Bill Elwell; Kevin Love; Rev. Derek van Gulden; Geof Lyon, Building Study Committee

**Absent:** None

- **Minutes:** Minutes from the November 11, 2019 meeting were reviewed and approved.
- **Treasurer's Report:** Bruce presented the Treasurer's Report and noted net income is over \$7,000 better than budget mainly due to a recent large donation.
- **Monthly Reviews:**

**Bank Statements:** Not reviewed. Kevin reported May/June statements were reviewed. Walter will ask Regina to make them available for the January meeting.

**PEX Statements:** Not reviewed.

### Old Business:

- **2020 Budget** – The draft budget was discussed. It was noted the loss of income from the day school has resulted in a significant deficit. Also noted that several items (office computer upgrades, professional cleaners to cover for the Sexton, potential Christian Ed position) were not included in the draft and will add to the deficit. Stewardship will be asked to provide latest pledge amounts prior to the 1/13 meeting. Possibility of increasing the annual withdrawal from the endowment was discussed. Trustees were asked to examine each line item in the draft and note any expenses that could be reduced.
- **Building Study Committee (BSC) Update** – The BSC met on October 12th and made the following recommendations on several items they were asked to review:
  - **Parsonage Garage Floor** – Rev Derek and the BSC determined the remaining part of this project can wait until better weather in the spring.
  - **Sanctuary Ceiling Paint** – No update.
  - **BSC Minutes** - The BSC will begin regular monthly meetings in January and will provide their minutes to the Trustees.
  - **Parsonage Bulkhead** – Bill reported this has been repaired.
  - **Law House Steps** – Bill reported the steps behind the Law House need repair. This item will be added to the BSC project list.
- **Exit Door Replacement** – No update.
- **Steeple Lighting** – No update.

### New Business:

- **Rainbow Flag** – The Cabinet has asked the Trustees to purchase and install 2 rainbow flags. Jan Goodwin attended the meeting and explained the rainbow flag symbolizes a welcoming and safe environment for all. Rev Derek will coordinate initial purchase of one 3x5 foot rainbow flag. It is unclear if the town considers the rainbow flag to be a banner which would require a permit.
- **Luminaries** – Rev Derek requested approval of luminaries to line the walkways for Christmas Eve. All approved.

- **Manger** – Bill requested permission to install the manger on the front lawn for the Christmas Pageant. All approved.
- **Steeple Post** – Historical Artifact subcommittee will be asked to make recommendations on what to do with the post on the front lawn.
- **Clock** – A rod going through the steeple wall is rubbing against the wood. Walter will investigate.

A copy of this report will be forwarded to the editor of The Old Sloop Log. There being no further business, the Board of Trustees adjourned at 8:05pm.

The next scheduled meeting of the Trustees will be Monday, January 13, 2020.



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## Stewardship Committee

STEWARDSHIP JANUARY 2020

### Stewardship Committee-January 2020

The Stewardship Committee extends a happy new year wish to the readers of the Old Sloop Log. The congregation celebrated Epiphany, or Three Kings Day as they call it in many places, at worship on January 5 and we are now into the third decade of 2000.

As we look back over 2019, we note a few of the committee's activities:

#### Fundraising.

- We had a fun and profitable restaurant night at Shea's Riverside in Essex in May which netted over \$600 for the church.
- We spearheaded a raffle for the Old Sloop Fair and with contributions from The Outreach Committee, The Deacons, and our own committee, as well as many individuals, six gift baskets were raffled off. The raffle resulted in six happy winners and an additional \$625 for the church.

- We tried to share very clear goals for our Fall pledge campaign this year in order to achieve a balanced budget for 2020. The Trustees advised us that a 6% increase in last year's pledging would be needed to fund this year's budget requirements. As of January 10, 2020, we were roughly on par with where pledges were last year. However, at that same date we still needed an additional \$24,000 in order to achieve a balanced budget of \$181,313. We are very grateful to have received commitments from several first-time pledgers and thank everyone who offers their time, talent, and financial support to the church.

### New Initiatives

The Committee defined two new goals for last year.

- Keeping Stewardship Alive Throughout the Year

Every fall during our annual pledge drive, the Stewardship Committee invites witnessing stewards to offer their faith stories that explore why they support the FCCR. We decided that it would be inspiring to hear from witnesses throughout the year and asked friends and members to contribute their stories to us via email or mail. We have posted excerpts in the Old Sloop Log and Sunday bulletin. We will continue to do this in 2020 and would love to hear from you.

- Increased transparency of pledge amounts

Rev. Derek asked the Committee to consider submitting a resolution to the congregation that would allow the pastor and chair of Stewardship to know the amounts of pledges in order to better carry out his responsibilities and those of the committee. This is not an uncommon practice among UCC churches. Officers responsible for other funds would also be allowed limited knowledge of certain donations. After much discussion, such a resolution was drafted and is being submitted at the 2020 Annual Meeting to be discussed and voted upon.

**The annual meeting will be held after worship on January 26, 2020. Please attend if can and vote if you are a member of the church.**

As we wrap up the old year and conclude our pledge campaign, take a minute to consider our theme: *Living the Love and Justice of Jesus, through Scripture, Service, Story, and Song*. The work of our church is far-reaching and long-lasting. In the words of Tim Chambers, one of our witnessing stewards last fall:

*"My Youth Leaders [at FCCR] helped me grow, they helped me mourn the loss of a Grandfather, and they've always been a guiding wind keeping me on course with my faith. Their constant love and support is in everything I do, including my Eagle Project, my journey at Massachusetts Maritime Academy, and my early departure from MMA to start a career at sea. I know they'll always be there for me.*

*While due to my career I am not here every Sunday, this church is always in my heart. So, as I continue to pursue my career at Sea I will strive to do my part to keep this Old Sloop Sailing."*

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## Membership Committee

### Practices of Faith of the United Church of Christ

#### Prayer

This month, the Membership Committee is continuing to offer a writing on one of twelve practices of faith in the United Church of Christ. We hope that considering these will stimulate your thinking about your faith and the First Congregational Church of Rockport (FCCR). This month we offer the UCC's discussion of prayer.

We invite you to read the following, whether you are new to the church or have been here a long time. If you would like to receive *Practices of Faith in the United Church of Christ*, with the UCC's pamphlets on each of the twelve practices, please contact the church office (978-546-6638).

#### Why do we pray?

We offer prayers as an expression of our awareness of God and to establish and maintain contact with God. The Psalmist wrote *"I will bless the Lord at all times, God's praise shall be continually in my mouth... I sought the Lord and God answered me and delivered me from all my fears."* -- Psalm 34 NRSV paraphrased

#### What is prayer?

Prayer is the intentional opening of ourselves to our Creator. It is the means by which we express the concerns of our hearts and spirits, sharing our thoughts with God, knowing that God cares about us in very personal ways. Prayer affords us a stillness in our spirit and attentiveness through which God is able to touch us and transform our lives. Often prayer is that which assures us that we are not alone in this universe nor are we left to our own abilities and devices. *"Do not worry about anything...let your requests be known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."*

*(Philippians 4:6-7)*

#### How does one pray?

We pray by simply acting on our desire to communicate with God. God hears us when we use simple, heartfelt words such as, "Having mercy," and God hears us when words refuse to escape our lips. We have the assurance that even if we moan, the Holy Spirit, serving as our advocate, will translate our concerns. In response to the petitions of his disciples, Jesus gave us a prayer that we honor as the Lord's Prayer (sometimes called the Prayer of the Disciples or the Prayer of our Savior). Prayers can be offered in song, dance and various kinds of movement. Christian tradition gives us as many different ways to pray as our minds can conceive. However, we should pray with sincerity of heart and with humility of spirit. It has been suggested that we live our lives as prayer offered to God.

### **Are there some common characteristics of prayer?**

Often, prayers will include one or more of these characteristics:

- Address – indicating to whom we are directing our attention;
- Adoration – acknowledgement of our deep gratitude for the nature of God;
- Confession – awareness of our personal and corporate concerns;
- Supplication – requests citing our particular personal and/or corporate concerns;
- Intercession – petitions made on behalf of others;
- Thanksgiving – appreciation and gratitude for acts already performed and/or in anticipation of things being done; and a
- Conclusion – closing phrase or sentence.

### **Are there different kinds of prayers?**

In a service of worship, we often hear specific prayers such as a prayer of invocation, welcoming God's presence; an offertory prayer, expressing gratitude for the gifts we have the privilege of sharing; and a pastoral prayer and/or prayers of the people, wherein the special concerns of the congregation are raised and given voice in the midst of the community.

### **What is an altar prayer?**

There is biblical basis for faithful believers to approach the altar in times of great need, seeking relief, consolation, and redress for their concerns, and as an expression of thanksgiving for blessings already received, as well as in anticipation of God moving in their behalf. The belief was that they would draw near to the place where God dwelled, submitting themselves physically, signaling their intention to commune with God. Today, believers continue this practice, sometimes kneeling or standing before the altar, other times standing near their seats, as prayers are offered beseeching God's

intervention on their behalf. In some traditions, altar call is a time of rededication and/or expression of a decision to commit one's life to Christ.

### **What are the postures for prayer?**

Our posture for prayer may be determined by time and place. Often, we simply bow our heads as did Moses (Exodus 34:8). The book of Ezra records that Ezra fell on his knees, spread out his hands to God and then offered his prayer (Ezra 9:5). Nehemiah 9 tells us to "stand up and bless the Lord your God." King David "went in and sat before the Lord" as he prayed (1 Chronicles 17). In Paul's letter to Timothy concerning prayer, Paul suggests that it is appropriate to pray "lifting up holy hands" (1 Timothy 2:8).

Traditionally, oil is used in a service of healing utilizing the sign of the cross. This is reminiscent of the African American spiritual which assures us that "There is a balm in Gilead, to make the wounded whole, there is a balm in Gilead to heal the sin sick soul." (The New Century Hymnal #553)

### **Does prayer make a difference?**

Both in our time and in days of old, we have the testimony of believers that prayer changes things and that God answers prayer. Prayer brings us, and those for whom we pray, into the presence of God in a unique and intimate way, where we receive courage, trust, hope and strength to address the circumstances of life, whether they change concretely or not. While our prayers are not always answered with response we desire, the very act of prayer, inviting God to attend to our concerns, affords us a new release and new attitude, which in itself provides us with a change.

### **Where will I find prayers in the Bible?**

Throughout Scripture we find the prayers of believers, although they are not always labeled as such. In Genesis 18, Abraham approaches God on behalf of Sodom; Moses and the Israelites offer a song of thankful prayer in Exodus 15; Hannah prayed both silently in 1 Samuel 1 and openly in 1 Samuel 2; Solomon prayed for wisdom (1 Kings 3); Esther manifested prayer through fasting (Esther 4); the Lord's Prayer is recorded in Matthew 6 and Luke 11; Mary's song of prayer is found in Luke 1; Jesus' prayer on the Mount of Olives is in Luke 22; and Stephen's prayer for his persecutors is in Acts 7. These are just a few of the prayers we can use as models.
